Board meeting. Much paperwork goes in and out of the office and the time is needed to get all info together for the appropriate committees. So, again, please remember – 21 DAYS IN ADVANCE OF BOARD MEETING. Thanks in advance for your cooperation. Boat Ramp/NE Winter Storage Committee

As our summer season of boating, letskiing, etc. comes to a close, there will be many of us removing our vessels for winter storage. Launching of all went on pretty much without a hitch in the Spring due in great part to your cooperation with each other, Jay and the cooperative as a whole. We ask that the same patience, communication and respect for each others vessel removal and storage needs be used for this portion of our season. The following will be noted in Buildings and Grounds but will be re-iterated here. When storing in the North End, please use as much of the perimeter of the storage area as you can first when storing you vehicle. An inventory of those vessels, trailers, etc. that are stored in the north end will be done within the next few weeks. Anyone who has a vehicle of any type, be it jetski, empty trailer, whatever, that is NOT registered with the office will be notified as to a time frame to register said vessel(s). This storage area is for those who have registered with the office ONLY. We appreciate everyone's cooperation in supplying the proper paper work for your stored vehicle. Those vehicles with no ownership markings of any kind will be presented to the Board of Directors with recommendations for the removal of said vehicles. Of course, PLEASE BE SAFE when removing and transporting your vehicles and do your best to

follow the 10mph Speed rule, especially when going over the Speed Bumps located throughout Vail's Grove. As a reminder, anyone who needs a key to the North End or the Boat Ramp can acquire one from several residents throughout the grove, names available upon request in the office. Thank you. Greetings Neighbors.

Well, another summer season is coming to a close. Everyone seemed to have a pleasurable and safe time on the lake without incident. Thanks so very much to all of you who are doing their level best to keep the lake safe for your self and for others while using your boat, jetski, Waverunner, etc. The fact that some modicum of safety is being followed by most lake dwellers without having any official rules and regulations posted is a great tribute to all of you. So as a Board and as neighbors, we thank you all and request your continued practice of "SAFETY FIRST". However, over the course of the summer and at this years Annual meeting, it has been brought to the boards attention (and to the attention of those at the Annual meeting) that there have been more than a few close calls on the lake between Wave Runners, Boats, jetskis, etc. that could have ended badly. So, we here at Vails Grove are requesting that our residents (who do use vehicles on the lake including their friends and/or relatives) to be mindful of the SAFE use of these vehicles, particularly when it comes to the SPEED in which these vehicles are used. Although a Wave Runner may be able to go in excess of 60mph does not mean it NEEDS to go 60 mph. Once again, this is first and foremost a matter of SAFETY, not only for those who are on vessels but for those who are just swimming or are using vessels that are not motor driven. At the speed in which these vehicles can go, it could be very easy for someone to be struck by one of the vehicles just because there was not enough time to react due to the speed in which a vehicle is moving, same as a car. We also ask that any of you who know other motorized lake dwellers from the surrounding communities to ask that they do their best to try and spread the word regarding these lake safety concerns. There has also been mention of folks taking out row boats, kayaks, canoes, etc. and not

using a Flotation Safety device of some sort in the case of capsizing. There was an incident several years ago in which 3 teen age boys in a canoe capsized in the middle of the lake. It was a day where there was no on else on the lake. A couple of people just happened to notice three heads trying to stay afloat and swim back to shore but they were out too far. Luckily,upon seeing them from their dock, the neighbors were able to get to the boys in time and pull them from the water along with their upside down canoe. None of these boys had life jackets, neither on their body nor on their canoe. They were all fully clothed with sneakers still on while trying to swim and all visibly exhausted (and frightened) from this experience. This could have been a tragic event but luckily was avoided. So additionally, please be mindful of the use of AND the availability of Safety devices for those who use any kind of vehicle (motorized or not) on Peach Lake. We also ask that you spread the word to all of our lakeside neighbors. Lastly, we should mention the proper disposal of debris that can accumulate on boats, namely empty bottles and cans. There have been several reports of glass (whole AND broken) washing up on shore that was either left over, fell or simply thrown caerlessly in to the lake. We ask that all those who do bring beverages and food out on the lake to please remember to bring the proper disposal bags and/or bins for these items as well as the timely removal of this trash or recyclables from the vessel. It is not unheard of for a bag full of bottles to topple over while still on the deck of a boat due to waves, wind, etc. Once again, for all intents and purposes. everyone is doing their level best to keep our waters and shorelines clean but a reminder can't hurt. The last thing we would want to see is one of our young children run into the water at our beach only to come upon broken glass. Before it comes to a point where Peach Lake might have to be Policed, we are hoping that we can continue to Police ourselves in all aspects of Lake

Safety.

Water Supply and

Pimp House-

The pump house and new water system is flowing smoothly. We have had a few glitches but, nothing to cause the stockholders concern. Overall, the new system is a welcome and overdue upgrade. Because of the ongoing lack of rain this year; I am asking everyone to conserve their water usage by limiting watering gardens and lawns. Try not to allow the water to run for extended periods of time while washing dishes and cleaning. A dripping tap can waste many gallons of water.

I, myself had a leaky outdoor tap from a split in the pipe this winter. It increased my consumption and I was notified that I had an overuse/leak of water at my residence. Once it was repaired this spring, I no longer made the list. I really didn't think that so little water could be picked up by the meter. It was and I took care of the leak as soon as the weather permitted.

Our wells show no indication of an issue. We all can be a little bit more mindful of our water consumption.

The cooperative keeps the cost of our water delivery to a minimum by having volunteers man the system. Jay Moore covers all issues during the week. We need weekend and holiday coverage. We are asking for stockholders to volunteer to take the Water Operators class that is held at Westchester Community College. It's too late to start this fall's class but, they will have another class in the spring. Cindy has the information in the office. Please give her a call.

Many thanks go out to Jay, Jack and Pat for giving many hours of their time to volunteer and keep our coop water flowing.

The current board is now in the process of reviewing and if needed updating our rules. Stockholders are encouraged to provide suggestion to the Co-op office.

A few reminders:

The speed limit in the Grove is 10 MPH
Pick up after your dog and make sure to walk
them on a leash

Parking on our roads should be avoided, use community parking spaces if needed

Grove: Neighbors and friends, as a new board member and a retired law enforcement officer I have been asked to address you on the issue of our speed limit on roads in the Grove. As you all know, or if you don't allow me to tell you, the speed limit on roads in Vails Grove is a posted 10 miles per hour. I will tell you that NONE of us in this community drives a vehicle at 10MPH. Why I can state this is two reasons, first, I have been trained as a police officer in speed observation and can estimate speed within 2 miles an hour, secondly, I have made a conscious effort over the last 2 weeks to consistently look at my speedometer and drive the car at only 10 miles an hour and at that speed people walking in the grove are going faster than my car.

While that may appear funny, (and it is a bit funny), what is not funny is that at speeds faster than 10 on our roads a serious incident is just waiting to happen. Perhaps it is an animal being hit and

injured or worse, a child being hit. I cannot stress to all of you how horrible it is to respond to a serious or even a fatal accident. WE DO NOT WANT THAT TO HAPPEN HERE!

There will be some of you who say that it is not us who live here that are speeding, and I will tell you that most of the speeders are homeowners in the Grove. We need to start paying more attention to our speed. I implore you to pay attention to your speedometers while you are driving around our beautiful community and to encourage others that you see speeding to SLOW DOWN!!!! Submitted by Julie Salerno

Did you know that legislation recently signed by Gov. Andrew Cuomo adds Peach Lake as one of the first tributaries in Westchester County to New York's list of designated inland waterways. This designation will now allow us to tap into State funds to address issues around the lake.

It was recently discovered that by adjusting the pH level at the sewer plant from 5.5 (which is

considered acidic) and mixing an additive to increase the level to 7.5, the odor from the sewage water decreased. North Salem Supervisor Warren Lucas reported recently to our editor that the piping is in and the pH sensors will be hooked up soon. To date, \$50,000 has been spent on this work.



Snake Island/Turtle Island/Peach Lake Island
