Pump House/Boat Ramp/Boat Storage

For the first time in my experience as a water operator here in Vail's Grove, we experienced a drought that was starting to effect water supply. While we never ran out of water, we did have trucks deliver water to get us through a few tough days in the summer. Thanks to Tyler with VRI, Hugh Andrews (for addressing any water leaks that occurred during the summer), Julie

Salerno (for coordinating water deliveries) and the excellent equipment we have in the pump house, we were able to divert the possibility of any dire situations in plenty of time. Neither our water supply to the grove nor the integrity of the water (in regard to safe consumption) were ever in peril. Our tanks and wells are all still in perfect working order. Thanks also to all of you in the Grove who assisted with your conservation efforts. You should all know it absolutely made a difference, did not go unnoticed, and is GREATLY appreciated! Again, thanks.

Boat Ramp/Boat Storage

Greetings all! Seems like it was an hour ago we were putting boats and jet skis in the water, but the time is once again upon us to pull our vessels out of the lake. Here are a few requests to hopefully make this transition a little easier this year.

- 1) When making arrangements to borrow keys for the gates, please try to call a day in advance when possible. Please do not call those with keys before 10 am or after 9 pm out of consideration for work schedules and such. As there are more people utilizing the boat storage area this year, the advance calling will give us key holders the opportunity to share with you since other neighbors may need the keys on any given day. Please avoid just showing up on the doorstep of a key holder unexpectedly requesting a key as you may have to be denied if others have already reserved them before you.
- 2) Please be sure to lock the gates immediately after you are finished at both the ramp and the storage area.
- 3) Please return keys to key holders as soon as possible on same day they are borrowed.
- 4) If you are using a company to bring your trailer to storage, it is STRONGLY advised that prior notice be given to the office first, giving the date and time a key is needed. If the office is unable to provide a key at the requested time, arrangements can be made to notify other key holders so that one of them can make a key available.
- 5) Last year, there were several occasions when one trailer was blocking another, and we were unable to determine who to contact to remedy this. This year, all key holders are being supplied a roll of duct tape and a sharpie. We are asking those of you who borrow the key to please take them with you and put a piece of tape on your trailer or vessel (so as not to ruin any surfaces) and write your last name and contact phone number should the need arise where you must be contacted to relocate your trailer. However, we are asking that THE BLOCKING OF ANYONE'S TRAILERS, BOATS, JET SKIS, ETC. BE AVOIDED AT ALL COSTS. PLEASE NOTIFY THE OFFICE OR ANY KEY HOLDER IMMEDIATELY IF ANYTHING IS BLOCKED ANYWHERE. PLEASE BE CONSIDERATE TO ALL BOAT STORAGE USERS IN THIS REGARD.
- 6) Please confirm with the office that all payments are up to date. You must be current with all associated fees prior to using the storage area. Thank you in advance.

For those who may not have seen, Buildings and Grounds has done a TREMENDOUS job in cleaning and freeing up space in the storage area, however this job is not complete. Buildings and Grounds is requesting (unless it is absolutely necessary) to please avoid bringing anything to the storage area prior to Monday, October 17, 2022 to give enough time to finish, for this year anyway, all housekeeping that is currently underway

in the storage area to make enough room for all. If you must bring anything down to storage PRIOR to October 17, please notify the office **ASAP** so that arrangements can be made with Buildings and Grounds to coordinate accordingly.

Dock removal will most likely happen starting after the first week of November so all vessels must be out of the lake prior.

As always, COMMUNICATION, CONSIDERATION AND PATIENCE is what makes this all possible. As we are still in search of someone who might be able to monitor this transition (as in the past), we depend on all of you to assist in making this all go as smoothly as possible. Thank you all!!
